I am quite often asked to speak to community groups which are interested in the services which we deliver. Earlier this month I spoke at the Bethlehem Probus Club meeting, which was attended by about a hundred enthusiastic, engaged members. They were interested to hear a bit about my background, and about the services which we deliver.

Community groups often think about our organisation as 'Tauranga Hospital' or 'Whakatāne Hospital', and are surprised to learn of the range of services we provide across the Bay of Plenty. When I talk about the funding we have available, I usually ask the audience to guess how much funding we receive each year. Quite often the first guess is \$1 million. Then a brave soul will up the ante, and tentatively guess \$20 million. They are always very surprised to learn that the funding we receive is over \$700 million per year. It is a huge resource, available to support the health and wellbeing of our communities. Whilst it is a significant amount of funding, there any many many demands on it.



I spoke to the Bethlehem Probus Club about how we take our stewardship of this precious resource very seriously, and how we all work hard to ensure that it is used wisely and prudently, to ensure that our community benefits as much as it can.

Peter Spratley is the president of the Bethlehem Probus Club and is also one of our hospital volunteers. It was great to meet Peter, and to recognise the important role our volunteers play in supporting our patients, family, whanau and staff.

What was absolutely lovely at the meeting with the Bethlehem Probus Club was their very positive feedback on the services they and their loved ones received from us.

During question time, a member chose to take the opportunity to say what great service we deliver. Another member joined in with their own example. My comment was that we have a great team of 3,200 who work hard to ensure that our patients, family and whānau are professionally and compassionately cared for. The whole audience then applauded in recognition of the care which you are providing to them.

I have to say I felt very proud to be part of this organisation which is held in such positive regard by our community. I promised to pass on their recognition and appreciation of all your hard work, great skills and compassionate care.
