## CELLULITIS TREATMENT UNDER ACUTE DEMAND

## Patient Information/Advice

You have been diagnosed with an infection of the skin called cellulitis.

Your doctor has put you on to antibiotics to help fight the infection.

It is very important that you **take all your antibiotics** to ensure that the infection improves. Please complete the course of antibiotics even if you are feeling better before the end of the course.

You should also follow the instructions to **elevate** the affected arm or leg above the height of the heart..

## Your doctor will want to see you again/sooner if:

- You have symptoms of an <u>allergic reaction</u>. If you experience severe symptoms such as swelling around the mouth, difficulty breathing, or you collapse please call an ambulance. For milder symptoms such as a rash or diarrhoea please see your doctor before taking further antibiotics.
- You start to feel <u>more unwell</u> and 'flu-like' with a worsening fever, uncontrollable shakes, light-headedness or dizziness. Drinking water/fluids and taking paracetamol may help with these symptoms. Seek medical advice if you do not improve.
- You think the <u>pain and swelling</u> in your arm / leg is <u>getting worse</u>. Your healthcare provider may draw a line around the redness. It is not unusual for the redness to spread and get a little worse before it gets better, but if increasing redness is associated with pain and swelling, please seek further advice.
- Your skin starts to weep and open up like a wound.

If you were started on intravenous (IV) antibiotics, you may be expected to return to the GP to complete the course of IV treatments and then follow this with a course of antibiotics taken by mouth.

→ If your <u>IV cannula falls out</u>, simply <u>apply gentle pressure</u> to the site for one to two minutes until it stops bleeding, and apply a plaster. The cannula can go in the bin as it contains no needle. Advise you doctor at your next follow-up.

Follow-up appointments during this episode of care are <u>free of charge</u>. If you think you need to be reviewed *sooner* than your booked appointment you can attend an <u>afterhours</u> <u>GP</u> at no cost (ensure you show them the <u>referral form</u> you were given).
